Associate/Full Professor Architectural Heritage and Preservation School of Architecture

The School of Architecture at the University of Illinois at Urbana-Champaign invites applications for a full-time, benefits-eligible, tenured position in Architectural Heritage and Preservation. Appointment at the rank of Professor will be considered for candidates with an established record of accomplishments in research and teaching.

Responsibilities:

The position carries equal responsibilities in research and teaching, with teaching obligations at undergraduate and graduate levels, including graduate student advising at the Ph.D. and master's levels. The person in this position will be expected to build an active program of scholarly research that connects with that of colleagues in the School of Architecture, the Department of Landscape Architecture, the Department of Urban and Regional Planning, other units in the College of Fine and Applied Arts and across campus, attracting support through internal and external funding. Paths to impact for this position could include community outreach and engagement, community-partnered innovation, interdisciplinary and interagency collaborations, leadership in policy (trans)formation, scholarly research and publication, high-impact public communications, and other platforms and methods. This position will also support state and regional government interests and needs with respect to contracted preservation and policy work.

Qualifications:

Requirements include a terminal degree in Architecture or a closely allied field (e.g., Landscape Architecture, Urban Design) or a terminal graduate degree in Heritage Studies, Heritage Management, or Historic Preservation with a focus on the built environment. Applicants should demonstrate an outstanding record of experience in the practice of preservation, fluency in the theory and practice of architectural heritage and preservation, a record of excellence in research and engagement, a record of excellence in teaching or clear promise thereof, and a compelling research agenda.

Additional preferred qualifications include: experience in building collaborative partnerships among stakeholders in organizing, inspiring, and catalyzing heritage and preservation initiatives through professional service and/or community engagement; a record of support for research, policy, and practice that empowers marginalized and poor communities to put placemaking, development, and regional identity in service of their economic prosperity; and experience working with Black, Latinx, and/or Indigenous communities and traditions.

Social justice dimensions are a key component of our program offerings. To increase this profile, we strongly encourage applications from individuals with demonstrable commitments to racial equity and social justice through teaching, research, and/or engagement, and a reflective approach to transforming the discipline with respect to inclusion and anti-racism. In this work the School of Architecture has support from dedicated staff at the college and campus levels who work with students, faculty, and staff to facilitate learning and transformation with regard to anti-Black racism, violence, and prejudice in all its forms.

Institutional Context:

As the second oldest school of architecture in the United States, the School stewards a worldwide legacy of educational innovation and distinguished alumni. The School offers B.S. and M.S. degrees in architectural studies, two-year and three-year professional M.Arch degrees, and a Ph.D. in Architecture. In service of these degrees, the School is organized around four program areas that integrate research and design: Detail + Fabrication, Health and Well-Being, Building Performance, and Urbanism. The School also offers joint graduate degree programs with Civil & Environmental Engineering and Urban & Regional Planning. Building upon its longstanding reputation for excellence, successful candidates will contribute to the School's diverse and proactive approach to reshaping the field.
